

Becoming A Wolf Cub

To be invested as a Wolf Cub you need to complete four requirements:

1. Repeat and explain the Wolf Cub Promise and Law.
2. Perform the Grand Howl with other Cubs.
3. Demonstrate the Wolf Cub Handshake, Salute and motto.
4. Learn about Lord Baden-Powell

Wolf Cub Promise

*I promise to do my best,
To love and serve God,
To do my duty to the Queen,
To keep the law of the Wolf Cub Pack,
And to do a good turn for somebody every day.*

When joining the Wolf Cub Pack you are voluntarily making the Wolf Cub Promise. After repeating the promise at your investiture, your fellow Wolf Cubs and Cub Leaders will expect you to live up to your promise.

The Law of the Wolf Cub Pack

*The Cub Respects the Old Wolf;
The Cub Respects Himself/Herself.*

The Law of the Wolf Cub pack states in

simple terms what is expected of each Wolf Cub. It encourages the Wolf Cub to show respect not only for the Cub Leaders and other trusted adults (the old wolves) but also promotes a sense of self worth and respect for themselves and the other Wolf Cubs in the Pack. As part of the Wolf Cub Promise, you accept the Law of the Wolf Cub Pack as your code of conduct.

Do Your Best.

Doing your best does not mean that you succeed on the first attempt and in fact you may never succeed. Doing your best means that you gave it your full and honest effort and that is something that you can take pride in.

The Wolf Cub Handshake



When Wolf Cubs greet each other they shake with their left hand. This is a sign of

brotherhood and trust that B-P took from a story of two feuding tribes in Africa. The warriors dropped their shield, which was normally carried in their left hand, and extended their now free left hand as a sign of trust and friendship.

The Wolf Cub Salute

The Wolf Cub Salute is made by first holding the index and middle fingers of the right hand in a “Vee” shape (similar to the peace sign) with the palm facing forward and touching together the index finger to the forehead.

The Wolf Cub Salute is only made when in uniform as a sign of respect, courtesy and friendship.

The Grand Howl

The Grand Howl is a ceremony performed at the beginning and end of every Pack meeting and camp. During the ceremony, the Pack recite The Law of the Jungle from Rudyard Kipling’s The Jungle Book and reaffirm their commitment to the Wolf Cub Law and Motto.
